The following is regarding that LJCL Website Contest:

This rubric is an adaptation for the one that National Junior Classical League will be using to judge your site. I, the LJCL Technology Coordinator, have changed a few bits of information based on what I think is more important, but much of it remains the same. Please look over what NJCL will use if you decide to submit yours to Nationals for judging. I highly suggest submitting your website to NJCL after submitting your website to LJCL. Even though there are a few differences, the key points listed below will ensure that you create the best product possible. Please consider submitting your website to the LJCL Website Contest and to the NJCL Website Contest. For LJCL submission of your website, please refer to the information below. LJCL Website Submission:

Within Sunday, February 21 and Wednesday, March 2, 2016 please submit your website for grading. Include in your email:

- The name of your local chapter
- The URL of your website
- The webmaster and his/her email address

These categories are limited to official sites of chapters in good standing; therefore, each chapter is held to at most one entry. Web sites must have been developed by LJCL member(s) in good standing; however, sites may contain materials developed by previous webmasters who are no longer LJCL members.

1. **Currency of information.** To keep members informed and engaged, a web site should be frequently updated to cover recent events and provide information on upcoming activities. Each entry to the contest will be eligible to earn ten (10) points per month (from November through February) for a total of 40 points.

A webmaster may enter the Website Contest without entering currency updates. However, if a webmaster DOES wish to earn currency points (which they should... easy points), they should email the LJCL Technology Coordinator* at technologycoor@gmail.com at the end of any month in which there are updates to the site. The email should include a list of links, pictures/screenshots, or other descriptions pointing to the areas of the site that have been updated or added during the previous month. To be considered for the ten points, the email must be sent to the LJCL Technology Coordinator by the individual chapter before the month is

over. For example, to be considered for ten points for February, the email must be sent before March 1.

***THIS IS BEING DONE IN PREPERATION FOR SENDING YOUR WEBSITE TO NATIONALS. WHEN SENDING ME THE INFORMATION, YOU MAY SEND THE SAME INFORMATION TO THE NJCL CO.CO.. IF YOU DO DECIDE TO SUBMIT YOUR WEBSITE TO LJCL OR TO NJCL, MAKE SURE YOU DO THIS. THEY ARE EASY POINTS THAT ARE UNFORTUNATELY COMMONLY OVERLOOKED.**

NOTE: OUR POINTS STOP AFTER FEBRUARY BECAUSE OUR CONVENTION IS IN MARCH. THE NJCL CURRENCY POINTS CONTINUE FROM NOVEMBER THROUGH APRIL. ALSO, THE SUBMISSION FOR THEIR WEBSITE IS LATER SO DO NOT SUBMIT YOUR WEBSITE TO NATIONALS WHEN YOU SUBMIT YOURS TO LJCL.

2. **Site design and execution.** The second facet of will involve an in-depth examination of the site against various judging criteria as provided in the rubric below.

**The site should display comfortably and be navigated easily on most screens, including widescreen computers, tablets and phones without excessive shrinking or stretching of elements.

Remember that the NJCL rubric is slightly different than mine so look over that one as well.
